Forest Of Reading

Lincoln Public Library is proud to be participating in the **Forest of Reading**®, Canada's largest recreational reading program!

This initiative of the Ontario Library Association (OLA) offers ten reading programs to encourage a love of reading in people of all ages. The Forest helps celebrate Canadian books, publishers, authors and illustrators. More than 270,000 readers participate annually from their school and/or public library.

The **Forest of Reading Award Programs** are where children and young adults pick the winner! Readers choose a program that they would like to be a part of, usually based on their age or grade, and simply begin reading! They can read all ten titles, or pick and choose to read only the ones they are interested in. Participants are encouraged to read at least five of the ten titles to be eligible to vote in April. We will have all the nominated titles available for borrowing.

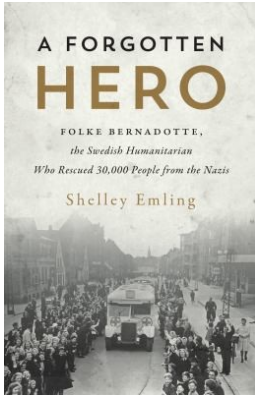

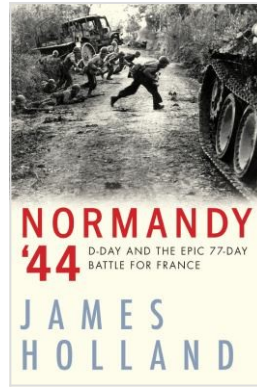
Remembrance Day

Both branches will have Remembrance Day displays of books and DVDs. Here are a few recent arrivals of interest:



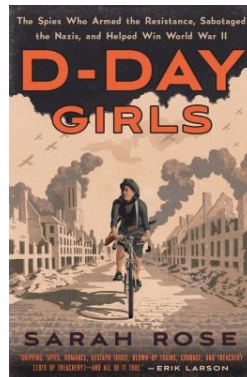
A Forgotten Hero: Folke Bernadotte, the Swedish Humanitarian who Rescued 30,000 people from the Nazis by Shelley Emling. The story of how the Swedish head of the Red Cross rescued more than 30,000 people from concentration camps in the last three months of the war.



Normandy '44 D-Day and the Epic 77-day Battle for France: a New History by James Holland. Drawing on archives and on the testimonies of eye-witnesses, Holland relates the extraordinary planning that made Allied victory in France possible.



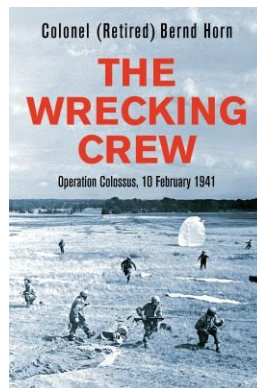
The Wartime Sisters by Lynda Loigman. Two estranged sisters are reunited in the early days of WWII. Resentment, however, festers between the two, and secrets are shattered when a mysterious figure from the past reemerges in their lives.



D-Day Girls: the Spies who armed the Resistance, Sabotaged the Nazis, and helped win World War II by Sarah Rose. The dramatic, inspiring story of the extraordinary women recruited by Britain's elite spy agency.



Dutch Girl: Audrey Hepburn and World War II by Robert D. Matzen. Several biographies have covered Hepburn's stardom, but until now none has covered her intense experiences through five years of Nazi occupation in the Netherlands.



The Wrecking Crew: Operation Colossus, 10 February 1941 by Colonel (retired) Bernd Horn. Discusses the audacious and controversial WWII raid undertaken by the British in the early days of the war.
